Mr. Kancharla provided a very insightful presentation on the functions and operations of the Tampa Port Authority. Some of the highlights included in the presentation were as follows:

- Approximately 50 million tons of cargo/year

- Diverse traffic base
- World's largest fertilizer port
- Rapidly expanding cruise homeport
- One of the top shipbuilding and repair centers in the southeast
- Economic impact:
 - \$8 billion
 - 96 thousand jobs

We have recently ended the 2006 – 2007 academic year. However, the chapter benefited from knowledge shared by local and national experts, as well as concluded another successful year under the guidance of the preceding USF ITE student officers, advisors, and supportive Tampa Bay area transportation engineering associations and companies. As the new officers transition into their new positions, we want to thank our predecessors—Achilleas Kourtellis (President), Dajana Vuckovic (Vice President), Vishaka Shiva-Raman (Treasurer) and Stephanie Bromfield (Secretary)—for their leadership. Their dedication and hard work continued to advance one of several purposes for this chapter: “to promote the advancement of transportation and traffic engineering by fostering the close association of students with the transportation and traffic engineering profession and the National Institute of Transportation Engineers.” The incumbent officers—Sara Hall (President), Enrique Gonzalez-Velez (Vice President), Hongyun Chen (Treasurer) and myself—look forward to further promoting the student chapter’s purposes in cooperation with the new TBITE executive board.

The spring semester ended with many activities hosted by the student chapter. First, Robert Poole, Director of Transportation Studies for Reason Foundation in California, shared his expertise on the future of public-private partnership toll roads. Numerous students and CUTR faculty, in addition to the Secretary of FDOT District Seven and the Dean of USF College of Engineering, attended. Second, Robert Chin, P.E. from FDOT District Seven office discussed the I-4 reconstruction project. The 1.5-mile long project will cost approximately \$167M. The new sections will support an estimated 16% truck trips and provide 102 feet in the median for a possible rail line. Next, Bijan Behzadi, District Traffic Design Engineer for FDOT District Seven, spoke to students about the

new specifications for the P.E. examination. Finally, the chapter celebrated the end of the semester with a picnic for USF ITE student members and CUTR faculty. The great weather made for a good turnout from both groups, as students and faculty interacted with one another.

Traffic Operations Design Engineer

Requirements: Must have 5 to 10 years experience in the preparation of traffic operations plans including traffic signalization, signing and pavement marking, and/or roadway lighting. Knowledge of Microstation, FDOT criteria and standards required. Florida P.E. is required.

Transportation / Traffic Studies Engineer

Requirements: Must have 3 to 8 years experience in the preparation of traffic operations studies. Knowledge of FDOT's MUTS and TEM required. Experience in the preparation of design traffic reports and/or traffic impact studies beneficial. Knowledge of the following traffic software beneficial: HCS, CORSIM, and/or Synchro. Transportation/ Roadway Engineer

Requirements: Must have 15 - 20 years of FDOT or similar agency roadway design experience. P.E. is preferred but is not mandatory. Requires knowledge of FDOT PPM and QC/QC procedures for roadway design and plans production.

Drainage/Stormwater Engineer

Requirements: Must have 3 – 15 years experience in the design of roadway and transportation stormwater management facilities. Knowledge of regulatory agency requirements is strongly recommended. Knowledge of stormwater modeling software is required, preferably ICPR.
